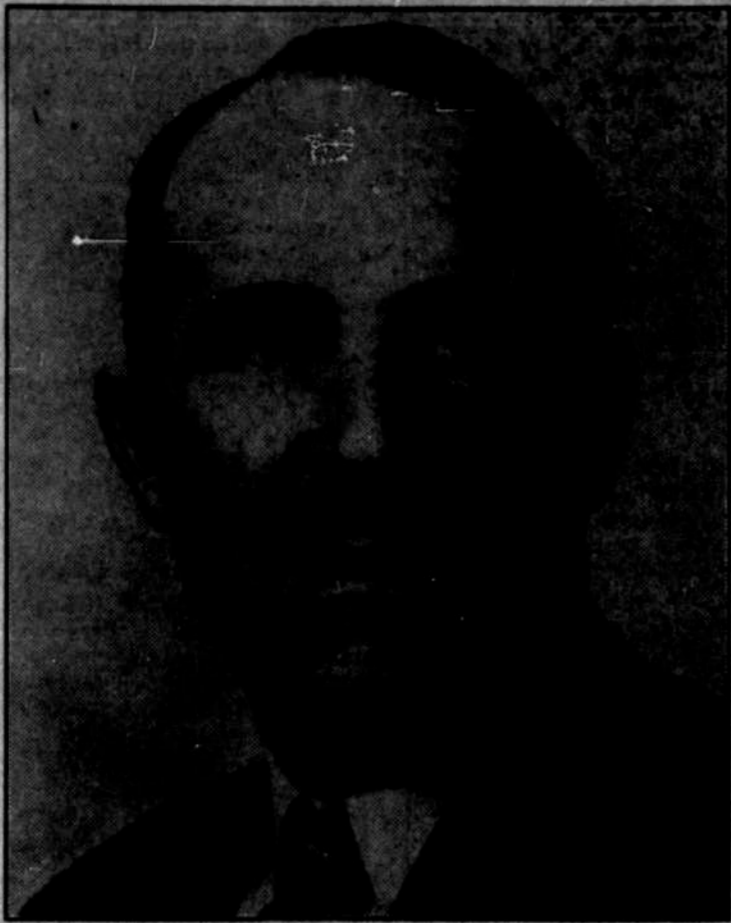
Members of the organization gave a shower during the social hour for Mrs. Tom Schaer, a recent bride. Refreshments were served during the late afternoon.
