## The Experts Say

THE opinions of unbiased experts, without a private axe to grind, frequently help Mr. Average Citizen to make up his mind on important matters.

Not that Mr. Average Citizen needs any expert help to evaluate the liquor traffic. Almost anyone when off to himself without joshing friends around will admit that this country and its people would be a lot better off without legal liquor. But, let's see what the experts write about alcohol.

**The Psychiatrist's View.** "The depressant effect of alcohol on the brain is the cause of the too numerous automobile accidents of the present time," writes Dr. Robert V. Seliger, Johns Hopkins University Medical School.

"Since 1928 . . . the actual number of women alcoholics admitted to mental hospitals (in Maryland) has increased from 18 in 1928 to 57 in 1938 . . . the percentage of women among all alcoholics admitted for the first time has approximately doubled."

"To summarize: Alcohol is an important and widely used poison. The action of alcohol is that of a narcotic, paralyzing control and restraint. The real treatment of alcoholics is embodied in society's attitude toward drinking; persistent and constant education of the effect of alcohol on the individual and society is indicated with a teaching to parents that a 'practice-what-you-preach' attitude is most important. Total abstinence is the goal of all treatment."

**Police Departments.** Police, District of Columbia, concerning arrests for intoxication: Females arrested for drunkenness in 1932 totaled 104, in 1935 totaled 1601, in 1938 totaled 1465.

Police Chief Hohmann and Highway Patrol Chief Cato agree, according to the Los Angeles Times, that 30 per cent of the fatal auto accidents are due to drunk drivers and drunk pedestrians. Chief Hohmann says further that "60 per cent of the police department personnel was engaged in disposition of intoxicated persons during 1939."

**Doctor of Medicine.** Dr. Harold Aaron of Manhattan in his new book "Good Health and Bad Medicine," as reviewed in Time Magazine, March 18, 1940: "Although alcohol is frequently used as a stimulant, its real effect is to depress the nervous system . . . like ether or chloroform."
