

## Coos Cheese To Be Scored

At the meeting of cheese factory managers and employees in the Coquille Hotel dining room last Friday evening, the association members agreed to the suggestions made by County Agent Jenkins for a scoring of the products of the several plants in the county with the idea of raising the quality of the cheese as has been done the past few years since the scoring of butter was started.

The operators also decided to make another display of cheese at the county fair in Myrtle Point next month. P. C. Roper, Myrtle Point member of the fair board, was present to assure the cheesemen of the utmost in co-operation by the board, and promised a suitable space for the display and the scoring which will be done by Dr. H. G. Willster, of O. S. C.

The dinner meeting was arranged for by Hans Selfors, deputy in Coos county for the dairy and foods inspector of the state board of health, and during his talk to the manufacturers he stressed the importance of the need by the factories to reject milk which was not clean and pure. In his inspecting of plants and products he sometimes found that the milk producer had violated the law in the matter of clean cans and clean milk and he urged the utmost on the part of the plant operators in keeping the Coos cheese product up to a high standard.

Bryant Williams, of the state department and other officials were present and made splendid talks along cheese industry lines.

Mr. Jenkins in his talk pointed out the improvement in Coos butter since scoring was started some years ago. Where not more than five per cent of the "butter" made in the county scored 93 some years ago, since the scoring was made universal more than 60 per cent of that product now scores 93. Better prices for both butter and cheese result from the higher scores made, for those higher scores can only be attained by the use of clean milk in the manufacture.

Joe Larson, of Marshfield, W. J. DeBoer, of Gravelford, Lawrence Rackleff, of Arago, and Joe Everest, of Langlois, were some of the manufacturers present and employees of plants from all over the county were in attendance.

## Sentenced And Then Paroled

A stay of execution was ordered for 30 days after which he will be paroled for two years. His offense was that of stealing parts worth \$35 from a locomotive over there, belonging to the McKenna Lumber Co. The tracks had been removed from in front of the engine and he claimed that he considered it abandoned property. He sold the parts for \$12.50.
