Sixth Column Hears Good Talks

Mayor J. Stanley Emery of Marshfield, in addressing the Sixth Column of Coquille at the Community Building last Wednesday evening spoke of the fighting virile spirit that conceived America, and of the long felt need for initiating a program involving education in what democracy really means—the freedom and justice it offers, in contrast to the near slavery of Dictatorships. "Certain foreign nations are looking at us with greedy eyes," stated the Marshfield mayor. "Today America should be fought for as never before, and, if need be, it should be died for."

Lieutenant Harold R. Johnson, of the Marshfield U. S. Army Recruiting Station, told of the peace time work of the army in building canals, harbors, and fortifications; in aiding explorers, and in developing new countries, and the war carried on against disease which, in itself, constitutes a major part of its work. He also gave the history of the flag of the United States, touching on each symbol and its meaning.

William L. Baker, of Marshfield, explained the necessity of temperance in organizing against the Fifth Column and of the need for such a move. He emphasized the important part that women play in the nation's democracy and of the work that they will have to do in event of emergency and stressed the need for preparedness to cop with such an emergency.

Mrs. June Walker, accompanied by Robert Burns at the piano, sang two patriotic solos and led the meeting in singing "God Bless America."

Open Season Dates For Game This Fall In Oregon

Sportsmen wishing cow elk or antelope tags should make application at once at the office of the Oregon State Game Commission, in Portland.

A total of 2000 cow elk tags will be issued and 1800 antelope tags. Should less than the quota be applied for by August 1, the tags will be issued in the order in which applications are received. Otherwise, a drawing will be held.

No formal application blanks are being issued. Those desiring the tags should send in their names and addresses and the kind and number of the hunting license they hold, together with a check or money order for \$5.00 for each tag.

The elk season this year will be from November 1 to 16, inclusive; the deer season from September 20 to October 26; the bull elk season in Clatsop county only, from August 24 to September 2, inclusive; and the antelope season from September 29 to October 6, inclusive.
