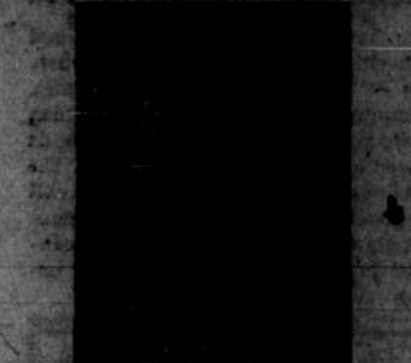


News Items From Adjacent Communities
