Cow Testers To Seek Uniformity

Cow testers, employed to keep production, feed, and breeding records for members of Dairy Herd Improvement associations in Coos, Curry, Douglas, Jackson, Josephine and Lane counties, will meet for a district conference in Roseburg on September 18, according to information received at the county agent's office, from Roger Morse, extension dairyman, who supervises the cow testing association work in this state.

The purpose of this conference is to provide an opportunity to discuss various phases of cow testing association work in an effort to develop greater uniformity throughout the state. Testers are requested to take to the conference, herd books for at least one registered herd, in which has been recorded the results of the testing work for a number of years. These are to be used at the meeting in completing permanent identification records thought to be of special value in building higher producing herds.

Testers from Coos and Curry counties, who will attend this conference, with County Agents George H. Jenkins of Coos county, and R. M. Knox, of Curry county, include George Smith, Coos Bay Cow Testing Association, Vernon Trigg, Coquille Valley Cow Testing Association, and Teddy Cadman, Coquille Valley-Curry Association.

Similar meetings will be held in McMinnville on September 17 and in Baker on September 18.
