# 16,867 Entitled To Vote In Coos **County November 5**

Coos county registration, which closed ten days ago until after the Nov. 5 election, showed a total of 16,867 entitled to vote. This was an increase of 2,960 over the number registered for the primaries last May For the presidential election four years ago the total was 14,749.

Of the 16,867 now registered, 7,165 are republican, 9,413 are democrat and 289 are independents, socialis and some other designations.

The republicans have increas their registration since Nov. 1936 by 92, the democrats by 2,042.
