

### Unpledged To Anyone He Says

In a personal letter to the editor of the Sentinel, Chas. W. Forrest, candidate for county assessor on the democratic ticket, makes some comments about his candidacy that in justice to him we will reprint:

It has been brought to my attention that there seems to be a misunderstanding among some in the Coquille vicinity as to my honesty of purpose in running for the office of county assessor.

Some are under the impression that due to the fact that I am a member of the I. L. W. U., a local union which is affiliated with the C. I. O., that perhaps I am a Communist trying to get into a public office.

To these thoughts, or possible rumors, I wish to say that I am an American born citizen, that believes in democracy and the democratic form of government.

The constitution of the United States gives the individuals in diverse occupations the right to organize and to bargain collectively. These individuals, although they may be affiliated to the C. I. O. or any other organization, still are under the American flag and the constitution of the United States. It is the constitutional right of any individual in one of these organizations to become a candidate for a public office if he so desires and can qualify.

I am a free and independent candidate. I am not obligated to anyone or to any group or clique and being a member of a labor union, naturally enough my own union endorsed me, and consequently the endorsement by the C. I. O. council with its various affiliated unions followed.

My wife, formerly Eleanor Brown, a school teacher, and myself are members of the Baptist church in Marshfield. This should prove to those that may have a doubt in their mind that I am neither Communist, Nazi, or Fascist, for I understand that these three groups do not believe in God.

My father's family were pioneers who crossed the plains and settled at Corvallis. My mother's family (Charles Eckhoff) were also pioneers and settled at North Bend.

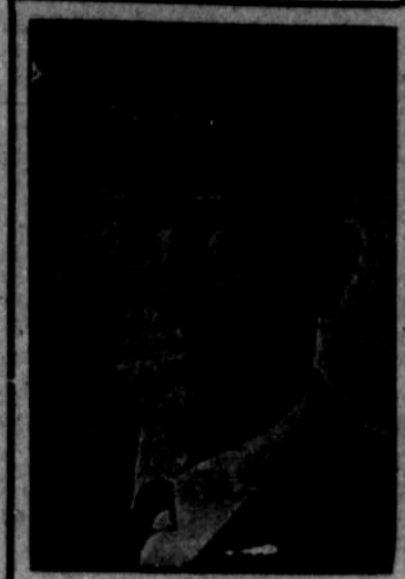
### Rebekah Lodge
