

NOTICE OF CITY BUDGET

NOTICE OF PROPOSED ASSESSMENT

Notice is hereby given that on the 21st day of October, 1941, there was filed in the office of the City Recorder by the City Recorder and the Committee on Streets of the Common Council of the City of Coquille a proposed assessment for the improvement of Heath Street from Fifth Street to Sixth Street in the City of Coquille, Coos County, Oregon. The whole cost of said improvement to the property owners and of said proposed assessment is the sum of \$466.80, and the boundaries of the district proposed to be assessed are as follows:

Beginning at the southwest corner of Lot 7, Block 40 Elliott's Addition to the City of Coquille, Coos County, Oregon; thence north 300.0 feet; thence east 280.0 feet; thence south 300.0 feet; thence west 280.0 feet to the place of beginning.

Now Therefore, all persons interested will take notice that said proposed assessment has been apporportioned and is now on file in the office of the City Recorder, subject to examination and any and all objections to such apportionment, that may be made in writing to the Common Council and filed within 15 days from the day of the first publication of this notice, will be heard and determined by the Common Council before the passage of any ordinance assessing the cost of said improvement and said matter will come up for hearing before the Common Council at a meeting to be held in the City Hall of said City of Coquille at 7:30 P. M. on Monday, the 18th day of November, 1940.

Bull Dogs Nose Out Red Devils

"Too much Crowell" very aptly described the reason the Red Devils lost a 20 to 19 decision to the Bulldogs at North Bend last Saturday. Not that the North Bend back did anything so spectacular, but being husky and powerful as he is, he would drag the Coquille tacklers from two to ten yards after they got hands on him. And there was another cause for the Red Devils' loss. Their tackling was not up to standard. On one very noticeable play, instead of tackling with his whole body in the play, one tackler just stuck out his arm and Crowell brushed by as though no opponent was there.

Except for this sloppy tackling, in spots, it was a mighty fine game between two well coached teams and the spectators got plenty of thrills for their money.

The Bulldogs showed plenty of fight, coming from behind in the second quarter to hit pay dirt twice and tie it up 13 all at the half, and again in the last stanza scoring a touchdown to again tie it, and then gaining the extra point by a line play.

The Red Devils made most of their outstanding gains on line plays, although Whereat's run after catching Crouch's pass was for nearly 40 yards. In two plays Holmstrom had plunged through for the six points. Just before the quarter ended Mc-Intee had caught Crowell's punt on his own 44 and eluding all but one of the Bulldogs, raced to the North Bend 14 before being downed. On the fourth play from there, at the start of the second, McCool went over the goal line and Couch kicked the extra point.

North Bend's two touch downs in this quarter came as the result of successful passes and the go-ahead power of Crowell in carrying the ball.

The third quarter produced no scores but in the last the Red Devils marched from their own 29 and McCool slipped through on an off tackle play to race the last 16 yards for their final score.

More passes and Crowell gave the Bulldogs their final touch down near the end of the game.
