Assessed valuations in Oregon decreased by more than \$3,780,000 during the past year, according to figures compiled by the state tax commission from reports of county assessors. In fixing the ratio of assessed values to true cash values the state commission reduced every county with the exception of Clackamas and Washington where the ratios remain unchanged at 46 per cent and 52 per cent respectively. Polk and Malheur counties are rated at the bottom of the list with assessed values fixed at only 44 per cent of true cash values, whereas Jefferson county tops the list with a ratio of 75. Other assessment rates fixed by the state tax commission include: Benton county, 53; Columbia, 60; Coos, 65; Deschutes, 46; Douglas, 64; Hood River, 65; Josephine, 62; Malheur, 44; Marion, 48; Multnomah, 53; Sherman, 69; Umatilla, 66; Wasco, 61; Yamhill, 53.

Requests for increases in the salary and wages item of the several state institutions aggregating \$96,240 to finance the employment of 77 additional nurses and attendants have been written into the institution budgets with the approval of Governor Sprague. This increase in the employed personnel of the institutions is designed to provide for a five-day week for those state employers who are now required to work from 12 to 14 hours a day for six days a week. The request for 77 additional employees, it is explained represents a substantial reduction from the number requested by the institution heads. Additional help needed at the state hospital for insane at Salem in order to put the five-day week into effect is fixed at 40 or more than one-half the total for all institutions.

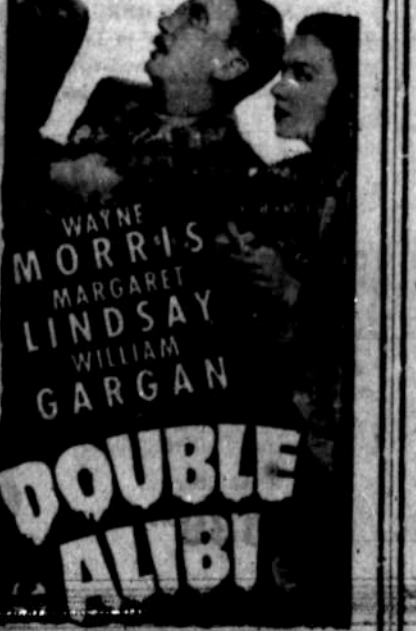
