 Notice is hereby given that the Common Council of the City of Coquille, Coos County, Oregon, will receive sealed bids for the completion of the improvement of Hall Street between First Street and Front Street, in the City of Coquille, Coos County, Oregon.
 All bids must be in accordance with the maps, plans and specifications of the City Engineer, filed in the office of the City Recorder on the 26th day of November, 1940, and pursuant to the provisions of Ordinance No. 433, adopted by the Common Council on the 2nd day of December, 1940, and the provisions of the City Charter and the statutes of the State of Oregon, therein referred to, all of which are hereby referred to and made a part of this notice. Forms of bids for contract and bond may be had upon application to the City Recorder. The Common Council reserves the right to reject any and all bids, with or without cause. A certified check in the sum of 5 per cent of the amount bid must be submitted with such bid, to be forfeited to the City of Coquille in

the event the bidder refuses to sign the contract and execute a bond as provided for in said ordinance. Said bond to be in the sum of 50 per cent of the total amount of the contract. The work must be completed within 15 days from the awarding of the contract, or within such further time as the Council may allow. Bids must be filed on or before the hour of 5 o'clock P. M. on the 18th day of December, 1940. All bids must be made for a lump sum, accompanied by unit prices, for the purpose of estimating additions or deductions made during the course of the work.

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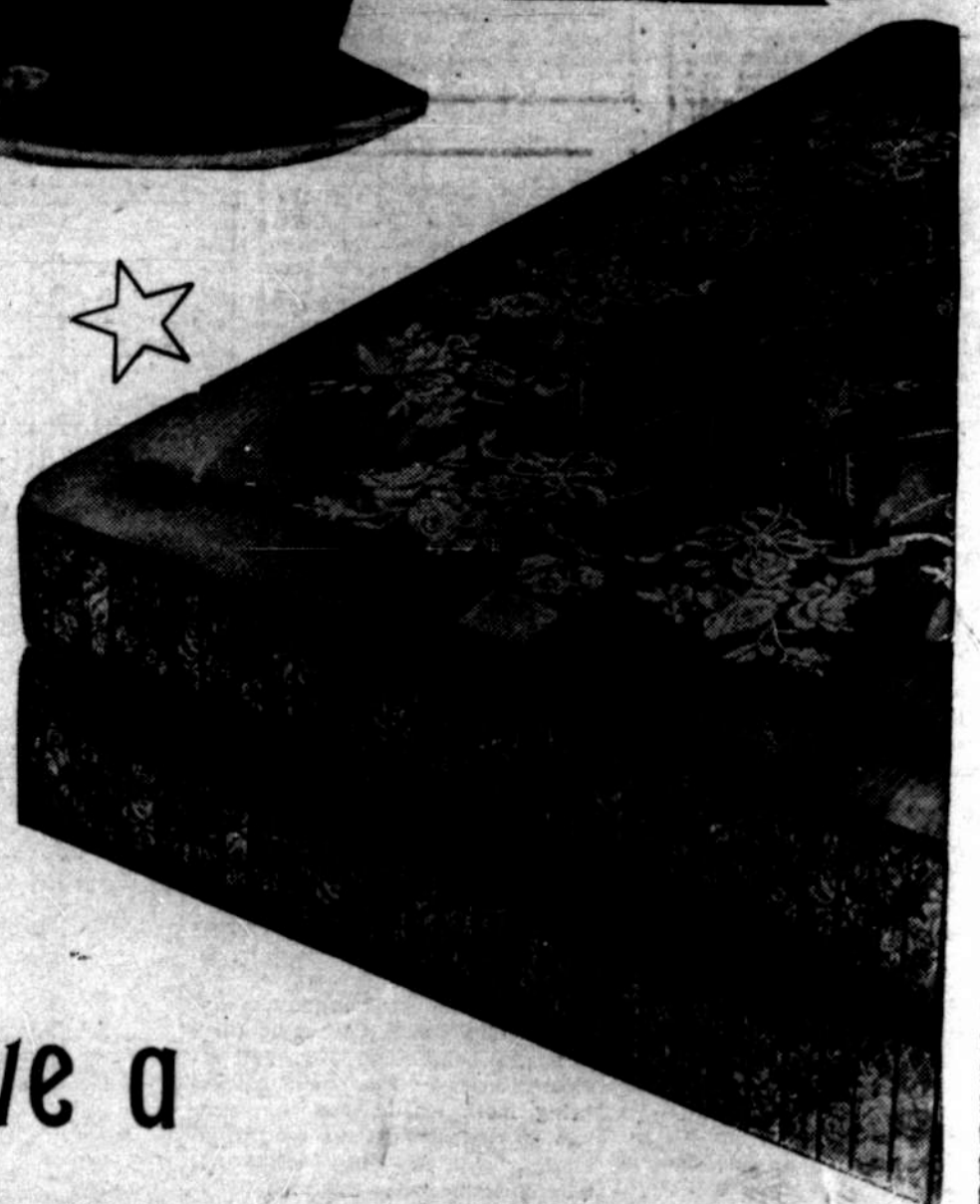
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
