Logging Truck Rules Out Soon

Rapid progress toward formulating rules governing the transportation of logs on Oregon highways was announced Saturday by Ormond R. Bean, state utilities commission. The announcement followed another meeting of the committee, initiated by Bean, of all departments of the state

proposed by Governor Sprague.

The committee decided to issue the rules in pamphlet form, distributing a copy to each operator of a logging truck and which will embody all of the rules affecting such vehicles on state highways. To date some of the

state highways. To date some of the rules proposed follow:

The disposal and reporting of lost log or log loads; new methods of loading; relating to binders, amended blocks; relating to binders, amended to provide for three rather than two binders as required now; binders must be arranged so that they may be released from the side of the vehicle away from the dump when unloaded; loose ends of binders must be securely fastened; providing for loading short logs on solo trucks; providing provision to require trailers being hauled on trucks to be securely fastened to prevent sliding or rolling off trucks and finally provision that logs with limbs, bark slabs, knots or other hasardous projections

The committee, said Bean, has for consideration specifications of binding chains and bales which will have a breaking strength of not less than 15,000 pounds. This proposed rule is the subject of further engineering study by the state highway commis-

Another rule yet to be considered relates to peeler logs and the loading and fastening on trucks so that other users of the highway will not be endangered by the transportation of this commodity. Yet another rule will consider the use of the steering

Another meeting of the committee, said Bean, would be held in the very near future. When the committee's work is completed, it will recommend the various departments issue orders
