Five-Year Logging Job in Curry County

A. A. Dimmick, who has been handling the business of the Standard Battery Separator company of Los Angeles in Curry county the past seven years recently discussed the new work coming up in that county for the Los Angeles concern which has closed a deal for a large tract of the Clayton Marks timber in the vicinity of Lobster creek, an affluent of the Rogue, 10 miles from the ocean.

"There are in the newly purchased tract 100,000,000 feet of fir and five million feet of white cedar," Mr. Dimmick said, "and its cutting probably means a job that will extend over a period of five years."

Mr. Dimmick manages all the camp logging and sawmilling that turns out the lumber required for the California concern maintaining a mill on Mussel creek. However, Mr. Dimmick believes he will establish a mill somewhere in the tract on Lobster creek and save a great deal of hauling of timber, as it is cut.

Trucking will be the method of getting the lumber to shipping points which will be Port Orford and Bandon.—Western World.
