### To Resume Drilling At Bandon Well

Drilling will be resumed at the well of the Pacific Petroleum Corporation east of Bandon during the coming week, or as soon as preliminaries necessary to resumption of operations can be effected, according to John Ewell, who is in charge of the project.

John G. Spiers and James Jones, both of Bakersfield, Cal., arrived in Bandon the latter part of last week. Mr. Spiers, who is accompanied by his wife, is an experienced operator in the Bakersfield district and dealer in supplies for oil drillers. Mr. Jones is an experienced driller. He is accompanied by his two daughters. The men brought a supply of tools which they believe will be sufficient to complete the job.

A number of improvements are being made at the seat of operations. Among them is the housing-in of the machinery at the derrick which will make working conditions comfortable during the winter weather.

Recent reports received from certified chemists in Los Angeles, who made tests of the gas from the local well, have spurred those associated with the project to renewed activity.

According to Mr. Ewell these reports have not only substantiated previous beliefs but have established positively that the gas is of a petroleum origin. Checking and double-checking between cores taken from the hole, the electric log recently made by a California concern; the reports from analyses made by responsible chemists and established geological facts, has convinced experienced oil operators that production is in sight, said Mr. Ewell, Sunday.

"We are determined to prove our contention," he declared, "and we will be grinding away to further exploration of the hole within a very short time."—Western World.

### Begin '41 Without Accident Urges Earl Snell

"Let's begin Forty-one without a one!"

Urging Oregon drivers and pedestrians to exercise care in order to avoid traffic accidents on New Year's eve and on the following day, Earl Snell, secretary of state, suggests this slogan.

Last year, four persons were killed in traffic accidents in Oregon on the last day of December. This year, Snell and others working in the interest of traffic safety in Oregon hope they can reduce this toll so that the state can start the new year with a clean record.

In view of the fact that statistics show that pedestrians are the heaviest sufferers during the holiday period, the traffic safety division has distributed several thousand pedestrian-driver cards, designed to acquaint both drivers and pedestrians with the situation regarding pedestrian accidents in this state and containing suggestions for avoiding such accidents.

These cards have been sent to every city and town in Oregon with

a population of over 200 persons. There they are being distributed by members of local traffic safety councils, service clubs and other civic organizations interested in traffic safety, police and county sheriff officials. Those who receive these cards are urged to give them thoughtful consideration and to remember the safety suggestions they emphasize.
