In describing the manner in which the natives iron, Mrs. Hale writes: "Betsey Umayam does our laundry.

She washes some things on Monday and puts them out on the line to bleach. Then on Tuesday or Wednesday she takes them in and starches them. She starches everything—tablecloths, napkins, underwear, etc.—but it is the custom. Then she irons the rest of the week. Clothes are not sprinkled as we do, they are rubbed with a damp cloth as they are ironed. The iron weighs several pounds and is heated with charcoal, which burns inside it. Every once in a while the charcoal must be emptied and a new fire kindled in a dish and then put into the iron. Often the clouds of smoke make us think the house must be on fire, but it is only Betsey ironing."
