## 1943 Examination Dead Line Law May Be Amended

While the last legislature enacted a law which would require every motor vehicle driver to take an examination before receiving a renewal of his or her driver's license, before 1943, a representative of the secretary of state's office stated recently that it was very probable that the law would be amended at this coming session of the legislature to exempt those who have taken the examination lately, and only require those who have been driving for years without an exam to take one.

With something over 450,000 drivers' licenses issued it would require ten or fifteen times the present number of examiners to handle the re-examination of every driver and it is anticipated that the 1939 law, which was passed hurriedly and without due consideration, will be amended.
