Coquille Ranks High In Coos County

1921 marked the first year for a class to graduate from our present High School building. The old school was in the Washington School along with the grade school. Mr. Lynn Parr who is now Superintendent of the Marshfield Schools, was Superintendent of our schools at that time.

As far as Athletics is concerned, Coquille has had only a few outstanding teams, but has always been a potential threat. In 1924 Coquille won the Coos County Championships in football. Not until 1939 was this glory given to Coquille High again. In that year we won the Championship of Coos County without a single point being scored against us. On Thanksgiving Day our team journeyed to Medford to play for the Mythical State Championship but was defeated 6 to 0.

In Basketball, Coquille has sent very few teams to the State Tournament, but in 1934 Coquille sent a team that ranked high. Track and Field events have been our main stay. Year after year Coquille has put out a track team that put a scare into all opponents. In 1940, Coquille sent a team to the Hayward Relays that won first place in Class C.

Coquille has a faculty to be proud of; our teachers have been educated in some of the finest institutions of our country. Coach Spike Leslie, a graduate of G. H. S. and then of the U. of Oregon, graduated from the U. of Oregon in 1914. Mr. Osika and Mr. Dunn received this Master's Degree at Oregon State. Mrs. Beyers, who has taught at Coquille High for seventeen years, received her training at the State University of Iowa, teaches Mathematics and Sciences. Mr. Osika came to teach in C. H. S. in 1932, working his way up to his present position, principal of our High School, and Mr. Dunn came as Superintendent in the fall of '37. Last, but not least, among our teachers who have been here several years, is Mrs. Osika, also an alumna of C. H. S. She graduated from the U. of Oregon, majoring in English.

In the remainder of our school year, many basketball games will be played in our new gym. Intramural sports will go on, the band will make many appearances, track and field events will be held in the spring and the teachers will continue to give 100% for the Coquille High School.

Vern V. Church, project superintendent of the China Flat-CCC camp, Siskiyou National Forest, will be transferred to the Zig Zag CCC camp on the Mt. Hood National Forest, January 15, according to Edward P. Cliff, forest supervisor.

Church will be replaced at China Flat by J. R. Philbrick who has served as chief of the special 40-man fire suppression crew at the Redmond Ranger Station, Cave Junction, during the past year.

Mr. Church is a veteran of the CCC organization, having worked as project superintendent of the China Flat and Rand CCC camps on the Siskiyou forest, and on the Wallows forest, beginning with the inception of the CCC program in 1933. Prior to that time he worked as a logging superintendent for a lumber company in north-eastern Oregon.

J. R. Philbrick is a technically trained forester who graduated from the School of Forestry at Oregon State College in 1934. He was employed as Junior Forester in the Steamboat CCC camp on the Umpqua National Forest from 1934 to 1940, when he assumed charge of the special 40-man fire crew on the Siskiyou.
