The movement today has spread all over the world, societies attend. tions. There are now 80,000 societies

with more than four million mem bers. Dr. Clark remained the leader o Christian Endeavor until his death in

mber.



Camp Fire Girls


The Coquella group of the Camp Fire girls met at the Washington school on Tuesday, the meeting being presided over by Helen Hickam.
