## 60th Anniversary Will Be Observed

In conjunction with Christian Endeavor societies all over the nation the local society of the Church of Christ will observe with special services next Sunday the sixtieth anniversary of the start of the Christian Endeavor movement.

The following history of C. E. was published recently in The Lookout:

Sixty years ago, in the Williston Congregational Church, in Portland, Me., a young pastor and his wife, Dr. and Mrs. Francis E. Clark, were struggling with the problem of how to hold the young people of the church. In the Week of Prayer services, about forty young people had become members of the church, and in those days there was nothing for them to do, no place for them in the church. To meet that need, Dr. and Mrs. Clark called them together on the night of February 2, 1881, and there fifty-seven young people signed the Christian Endeavor pledge: "Trusting in the Lord Jesus Christ for strength, I promise Him that I will strive to do whatever He would have me do."

This young society grew so rapidly and did such splendid work, that other churches began to follow its lead. Soon hundreds of societies were springing up over the country. In but five years it had grown so widespread that Dr. Clark had to resign his pastorate to devote all his time to the new movement. Great national conventions began to be held each year, drawing as high as 5,000 delegates. The movement today has spread all over the world, societies being found in more than fifty countries and in eighty-nine denominations. There are now 80,000 societies, with more than four million members.

Dr. Clark remained the leader of Christian Endeavor until his death in 1927, when Dr. Daniel A. Poling, succeeded him. Mrs. Clark is still living. She was ninety years old in December.

## "Truth" Subject At Christian Science Churches Last Sunday

"Truth" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, January 26.

The Golden Test was, "Thou art near, O Lord; and all thy commandments are truth. Concerning thy testimonies, I have known of old that thou hast founded them for ever." (Ps. 119: 151, 152).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "And many people shall go and say, Come ye, and let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob; and he will teach us of his ways, and we will walk in his paths; for out of Zion shall go forth the law, and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem. O house of Jacob, come ye, and let us walk in the light of the Lord" (Isa. 2: 3, 5).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" by Mary Baker Eddy: "The life of Christ Jesus was not miraculous, but it was indigenous to his spirituality,—the good soil wherein the seed of Truth springs up and bears much fruit. Christ's Christianity is the chain of scientific being re-appearing in all ages, maintaining its obvious correspondence with the Scriptures and uniting all periods in the design of God." (p. 270).
