Leading all the way, except in the first two or three minutes when the score was tied, the Coquille Red Devils won the basketball game from the Bobcats on the local court floor Tuesday night by an 8-point margin, 28-20.

Playing on their home floor which has a higher ceiling than the one at Myrtle Point, they were not handicapped by having their tosses hit the ceiling. The Devils played a strong defensive game, too, and the scores at each quarter were unusually low. First quarter end it was 7 to 5, half time 14 to 10, third quarter 22 to 12, and final 28 to 20.

There were very few shots of the "way out" variety, both squads depending on team work for getting the ball near the basket. There was some very pretty team work on both sides, with the Devils making a little more classy demonstration.

The Myrtle Point B squad took the preliminary by a 25-17 score.

The same evening the North Bend Bulldogs took their third game from the Marshfield Pirates, 30-21, in a contest which saw 31 personal fouls called.
