

Joe E. Brown's Biggest Laugh Hit--- "So You Won't Talk?" At Liberty Sat., Sun.

Joe E. Brown's long absence from the screen makes his new Columbia comedy, "So You Won't Talk?" especially desirable in anticipation. But the picture, which shows Saturday and Sunday at the Liberty Theatre, has been hailed from coast-to-coast not only because it marks Brown's return after a four months' hospitalization but because it is a film which rates the highest of applause for its ingenious narrative, hilarious situations and tense, laugh-laden action.

In "So You Won't Talk?", Joe E. is seen as a timid book reviewer whose beard hides not only his features but his inferiority complex. When, finally, he is persuaded to shave it off by his girl friend, he discovers himself the double of a notorious gunman. Unfortunately for Joe E., and fortunately for Joe E.'s many fans, the gunmans pals discover the resemblance at pretty much the same time. And, not very long afterwards, so does the gunman!

The difficulties Joe E. Brown meets and successfully vanquishes, as the book reviewer, are as nothing to the many problems Joe E. Brown, the actor faced, in bringing to the screen his dual role. As the killer he had to abandon all the familiar tricks of

speech and of action which made him so popular a comedian; he had to play a lamb and a wolf; he had to play a wolf imitating a lamb and vice versa. The result is said to be one of the most delightful Joe E. Brown comedies in years.

Frances Robinson, lovely young starlet, appears opposite Brown. Formerly seen in such films as "Tower of London" and "The Invisible Man," Miss Brown makes her debut in screen comedy. Hollywood reports that it is very successful debut indeed.

Other important members of the all-star comedy cast include Tom Dugan, Vivienne Osborne, Dick West and Bernard Nedell. Edward Sedgwick, who directed Joe E. Brown in many of his previous screen hits, wielded the megaphone on this one. The original story was penned by Richard Flournoy, famed for his "Blondie" scripts.

How Many Pay Attention To It?

Greater observance of the state regulation governing the operation of a motor vehicle being overtaken and passed by another is necessary in the interest of greater traffic safety in Oregon, according to a statement from the traffic safety division of the secretary of state's office today.

Recently Oregon citizens have written to the office, suggesting that motorists attention be called to the rules requiring overtaken cars to give way to the right when being passed on streets or highways. According to these suggestions, many drivers fail to observe this requirement with the result that overtaking vehicle is forced out into the path of oncoming cars or is unable to go around the slower-moving vehicle.

"The driver of an overtaken vehicle shall give way to the right in favor of the overtaking vehicle on suitable and audible signal and shall not increase the speed of his vehicle until completely passed by the overtaking vehicle," says Oregon law on this subject.

Courtesy and safe driving practice require the driver to observe this rule when being overtaken, the statement declared. Oregon law provides that cars always shall be driven as near the right hand side of the street or highway as is practicable and when slow-moving vehicles stay close to the center line, other vehicles are held up and passing is dangerous.

S.M.A. To Aid Lunch Program

A healthy America, through extension of the school lunch program to over 35,000 Oregon school children within the year, is the goal of an advisory committee of state farm, educational, nutritional and welfare leaders, announced today by the Portland office of the Surplus Marketing Administration. Administered by the Surplus Marketing Administration in co-operation with the State Welfare Commission, WPA and NYA, 15,000 Oregon school children are now participating in school lunches made available through distribution of agricultural surpluses.

"Since as many children in well-to-do families, as well as children of families receiving public assistance, are subject to improper diet, the committee expects to stress that the health of tomorrow's citizens is of primary concern to everyone," said M. Louis Bolangie, area director, Surplus Marketing Administration. "Any school may participate in the School Lunch Program upon certification by school principals, county administrators, health authorities, or

responsible officials that malnourished children will benefit."

Camp Fire Girls

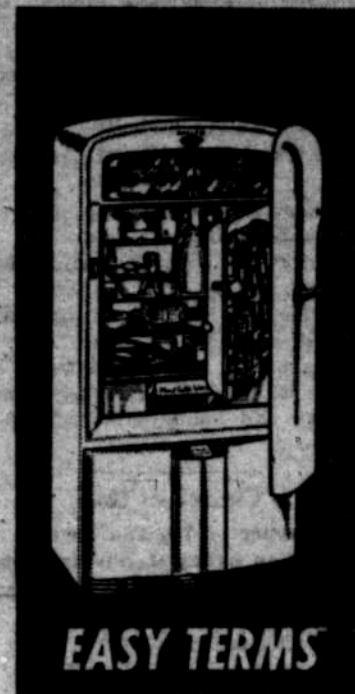
