



List of Surplus Foods For Month of April

Surplus foods which will be available to families taking part in the Food Stamp Plan in the Coquille area during the April 1 to April 30 period have been announced by M. Louis Belangie, area supervisor for the Surplus Marketing Administration. These are the surplus foods which may be obtained in exchange for blue surplus food stamps in local stores. The nationally designated surplus foods available in all areas for the April to April 30 period are as follows: Fresh grapefruit, oranges, apples, carrots, onions (except green onions), Irish potatoes, butter, raisins, pork lard, all pork (except that cooked or packed in metal containers), corn meal, shell eggs, dried prunes, hominy (corn) grits, dry edible beans, wheat flour and whole wheat (graham) flour.

Catch report cards, needing neither signature nor postage, can be obtained at your sporting goods store, and game commission officials urge every angler to obtain a supply of these cards and send them in after each fishing expedition during the coming season.

The commission is using four crews to survey lakes and streams in the state, and the information sent in by the fishermen will be of tremendous importance in making the final determination of the amount and species to release in the waters of the state.

So to every fisherman goes the earnest request that regular use of the catch report cards be made during the entire fishing season of 1941!
