### Livestock Ass'n To Meet At Gold Beach, April 10 - 11

The Rogue River Rogues will provide the entertainment and recreation program next Thursday evening at the close of a two-day session of the Western Oregon Livestock Association scheduled for Gold Beach April 9 and 10. Better land use and a revision of laws to permit or encourage better land use has been the objective of this organization and will again be the major theme, according to Albert Powers, Coquille, president of the association.

On the afternoon of the ninth committee members from all counties in western Oregon will study and formulate reports or recommendations on predatory animal control; wild life conservation and its relation to livestock operations; public lands under county, state and national control or ownership; legislation, taxation, and transportation; and various other problems of general and special interest. Harry Lindgren, Corvallis, secretary of the organization, predicts one of the liveliest animal meetings ever held. He also states that rapid and substantial growth of the association promises a bright future.

J. H. Turner, Gold Beach, president of the Curry County Livestock Association, urges and invites all county association members to attend so that unity of effort and action for general betterment will result. Prof. E. L. Potter, Corvallis, will discuss the livestock outlook. Arrangements for the program and reservations are being handled by R. M. Knox, Gold Beach, secretary of the Curry county association. According to his records the advance reservation indicate the largest attendance in the history of the association.

Douglas Pine, farm adviser, of Eureka, indicates that fourteen of the livestock directors from Del Norte and Humboldt counties in California plan a visit with their Oregon neighbors on the tenth.
