Heavier Travel This Year In Oregon

That the out-of-state automobile travel on the Coast Highway is materially greater in volume than it has been in previous years is the unanimous opinion of those who travel up and down the coast.

This writer, who watches the out-of-state cars in the Coquille to Bandon stretch nearly every evening, and as far south as Port Orford once a week, finds that there are more California license plates on cars using this stretch of road than those of all other states, outside Oregon, combined, with Washington cars ranking second. Cars from every state in the Union, except two or three in the New England states and may be half a dozen of the southern states have been noted, and it is not at all unusual between five and six o'clock any evening, to meet from 60 to 100 out-of-state cars between Coquille and Bandon.

The following on this subject for the state as a whole is from the highway commission's office in Salem:

Oregon's tourist travel for 1941 has shown a distinct increase over 1940, according to figures compiled by the Travel and Information department of the Oregon State Highway Commission.

With the non-resident automobile registration law repealed, it was necessary for the Travel department to seek other yardsticks to measure the tourist business for this year.

One exact index is registration of cars at Crater Lake National Park. These showed an increase of 4,715 automobiles or 18.2 per cent over the same period last year. The Crater Lake figures represent the travel year which ends August 31. Another index is gasoline tax receipts which increased \$710,000 for the first six months of 1941 over the same period in 1940.

The Travel department queried representative resorts, hotels, auto camps and other businesses catering to the tourist asking a number of questions about this year's tourist business.

An increase of out of state cars was reported by 57.4 per cent of them, a decrease by 12.8 per cent, no change by 23.4 per cent and 6.4 per cent could not answer. That non-resident visitors were spending more money in 1941 than in 1940 was the opinion of 57.4 per cent of those replying, while 23.4 per cent thought less money was being spent, 12.8 per cent reported no change and 6.4 per cent did not know.

General tourist business was reported better by 74.5 per cent, poorer by 12.8 per cent, the same by 10.6 per cent and 2.1 per cent did not know.

That national defense industry and military travel had increased their 1941 business was reported by 27.7 per cent, had decreased it by 14.9 per cent, not affected it by 51 per cent and 6.4 per cent were unable to answer.
