

Preparing Coos State Fair Exhibit

Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Hampton, who have been up in Washington, across the river from The Dalles, returned last Saturday to their home in Arago and were "glad to get back to God's country," as George expressed it. He had been working on the federal airport project across the Columbia from The Dalles for the past three months, operating a jack hammer. The government airport there will have three runways, each 500 feet wide and a mile long when the project is completed.

Mr. Hampton had to return at this time to arrange for the Coos county exhibit at the state fair which opens Sept. 1. He stopped at Salem on the way home and was told by the fair management that the stock exhibit there will be largely increased this year, three applications having recently been made by Montana concerns for a showing of beef cattle.

Cranberries To Run 800 to 900 Boxes

The Sentinel scribe had occasion to visit the cranberry bog of E. B. Fish & Son, east of Bandon, on business Monday, and took a look over the five-acre Fish bog. The berries which lie nearly as thick as there is room, are beginning to color up, although picking will not start till about the first of October. Mr. Fish said he expected they would harvest between 4,000 and 4,500 boxes this fall, but he added that he thought the E. D. Webb bog would produce about 500 boxes more than his would.

He and his son, Sumner, have kept busy the past winter getting an enlarged grading machine ready to operate, and they are now busy at work getting the box shooks nailed up and the boxes labeled.

Mr. Fish said it would require about 150 pickers at their bog alone when the season is on.

Mrs. Helen C. Sperry, writing from Oakland, Calif., tells the Sentinel of the death of a former Coquille lady who left here more than a quarter of a century ago. She was Mrs. George Peoples, whose death occurred Aug. 11 at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Gordon Parke (Josephine).

The end came rather suddenly although she had been an invalid for years. Mrs. Peoples was a native of California, an alumnus of the University of California, had taught school in Canada before living in Coquille, and was interested in educational matters until the end.

When they lived in Coquille Mr. Peoples was manager of the creamery which later became the Swift & Co. plant.

Teachers Register Papers

The office of the county school superintendent is receiving many teachers contracts, teaching certificates, and health examination certificates for registration. Under the law which went into effect on June 14, every teacher is required to have an examination to show that he is free from communicable tuberculosis. A negative skin test taken within the last six months before the date of contract is necessary, and in case the skin test is positive the teacher must have an X-ray which is sent to the State Board of Health and examined by six specialists.

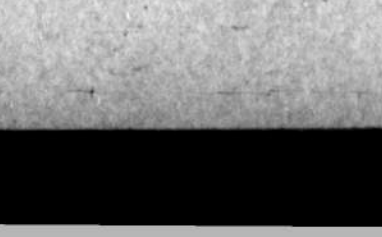
