asked that the property owners along the highway, between Fifth and Sixth street, be required to have the weeds cut was referred to the street department.

The citizen committee which with the members of the council will prepare the city's budget for 1942 in the near future, was appointed. The committee consists of D. E. Rackleff, O. T. Gant, E. A. Walker, John Purkey, Dr. T. De La Rhue and George H. Chaney.

The council approved the mayor's contention that the city police are not subject to orders from the district attorney. The sheriff's force work in conjunction with the D. A., but if he has matters in Coquille which need attention they should be taken up with the city's governing body and not the police direct was the council's decision.

Engineer Gearhart reported that he was conferring with Mr. Sage of the state highway department in regard to surfacing the south end of Hall street and finishing the improvement there as agreed upon by the city with LeRoy Harrison.

The engineer was also instructed to purchase three carloads, about \$300 worth, of crushed gravel for the city's stock piles, the gravel to be used in street repair work.

Four traffic signs for placing near the school houses in the city were ordered secured.

The final action by the council was the instructions to City Attorney Greenough to begin the preparation of resolutions looking to the presentation of a charter amendment which will be up for a vote at the next city election.

This charter amendment, if and when adopted, will provide for compensation for mayor and members of the council. More and more are municipalities coming to realize that to ask its governing body to serve without pay is unjust and, as was pointed out Monday evening, if councilmen are to be abused and demeaned, as has happened not long since, it will soon be impossible to secure the consent of anyone to serve as mayor or on the council.

Should the amendment be adopted it cannot become effective in the city of any of the other cities in the state. The proposal has considerable merit and is one which should and will be given much thought by the voters.

No salary suggestions were made Monday evening but the League of Oregon Cities will be asked for information as what cities the size of Coquille are paying.

Baseball Play-off Starts Aug. 31

The Coquille Indians won a tight ten-inning game from Portland-Langlois at Port Orford last Sunday, 7 to 6, and are now tied with Marshfield for third place.

The same day North Bend won from Empire, 7 to 3, and Bandon won from Marshfield, 9-6. The Myrtle Point game was forfeited to Powers.

This coming Sunday finds two double headers scheduled, but with Coquille not playing. The two twin bills are the result of earlier postponements and the schedule calls for the Port Orford-Langlois team to play at Marshfield, one game with that club and the other with North Bend. Empire at Powers is the other double header.

The club managers are to meet with President W. H. Fortier at Bill's Place here this evening, to decide on details for the play-off which will start Aug. 31, but until this coming Sunday's games are played it will not be known which clubs will rank one, two, three and four. The Indians will get into the play-off either as three or four. Should P. O.-Langlois win from Marshfield and then lose to North Bend, the Coquille team will have undisputed possession of third place.
