Peak Of Season For Unskilled Labor Is Due

With new industrial jobs taking double the number of workers of last summer and with the active file 30 per cent lower, state employment service officials are making every effort to provide sufficient labor for the peak demand expected in the next 30 days—mainly in the bean, hop and fruit harvest.

Clearances of available workers are being made rapidly through the 25 employment offices to meet shortages in various parts of the state. Recent reports show about 2,000 bean pickers urgently needed in Yamhill, Clackamas, Marion, Linn and Lane counties. This figure may reach 4,000 before the end of August.

Despite slightly lower expected production, hop growers are asking for 30,000 pickers about September 1 with several thousand also needed for the early harvest starting next week. Many of the nearly 20,000 bean pickers will go into hop fields, while others may pick fruit in the Rogue River and Hood River valleys.

Regular placements by the employment service during July were 8835 against 4404 for the same month last year. Supplementary jobs, mostly in harvesting, increased from 13,511 to 18,819. For the first seven months employment officers have reported 114,322 jobs filled against 83,272 in 1940.

The active file of available workers has declined to 26,895 as against \$9,506 a year ago. Of these 14,011, including 9,400 men, are in the Portland area. The number of women workers on call has declined 21 per cent in a year, while the number of men is down 38 per cent.
