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Wed At Candle Light Service

At an impressive candlelight service, Elois E. Wilson, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. M. Wilson, was on Saturday at 8:30 p. m. wed to Oscar E. Carlson, of Portland, the son of Mrs. Mary Carlson, of Seattle. The double ring ceremony was performed by Rev. Charles G. Brown, who was assisted by Rev. P. S. Clapp, of Cascade College, Portland, at Pioneer Methodist church. Rev. Clapp offered the consecration prayer. Baskets of white gladioli, palms, and slender white tapers decorated the church.

Miss Wilson, who was given in marriage by her father, was lovely in sheer nylon chiffon. Her wedding gown, with its sweetheart neckline, had a very full skirt with train and long sleeves. The full length veil of bridal illusion trimmed with chantilly lace was held in place by a coronet of seed pearls and tulle. She carried a shower bouquet of gardenias, stephanotis and pink bride's roses. Her lace handkerchief had been carried by her honor attendants, Mrs. Hubert Ulrich and Mrs. Richard Christensen, at their weddings. Mrs. Ulrich and Mrs. Christensen wore powder blue embossed organza with puffed sleeves and sweetheart neckline. Their shoulder length veils were bound to their heads by coronets of gladioli. 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Pair On Tandem Bicycle Stop For Visit Here

On the last lap of a 500-mile trip by tandem bicycle through northern California and Oregon, Mr. and Mrs. Damon Godfrey stopped here Monday for several hours. They are riding a French tandem purchased before the outbreak of war. All of its metal has been chromed and it is equipped with a special brake. On the bike, Mr. and Mrs. Godfrey have travelled as many as a hundred miles in a day. Generally they average between 50 and 75 miles.

This is their first long trip. According to Mrs. Godfrey, the trip has been a test to determine if it would be practical for them to attempt a tour around the boundaries of the United States. On their first expedition, a 75 mile jaunt around Golden Gate skyline, Mrs. Godfrey said they nearly killed themselves, for they had not learned to rest whenever they became tired. Despite crossing the McKenzie Pass and other steep grades, they asserted on arriving here that they were not at all tired. The only problem presented by tandem travel, according to the Godfreys' experience is that of keeping in clean clothes. On the back of the bike are two neat green bags resembling saddle bags. These contain a small tent, two air mattresses, cooking utensils, toilet gear and two primus stoves. Mrs. Godfrey said that they generally started out in the morning in clothes still damp from laundering on the previous night.

The Godfreys' home is in Oakland, California. They drove to Klamath, California, where they left their car and started out on the tandem. In commenting on the advantages of tandem travel, Mrs. Godfrey said that they had found "a whole new world of smells." Gasoline fumes, she said, drown out the fragrance of the forests and the sweet scent of the fields. Their silent approach lets them come close to countless little wild animals and birds, and on one occasion they rode near a doe with twin fawns.
