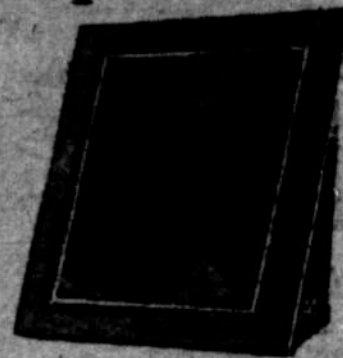
The announcement was in the form of an invitation in rhyme to attend an evening party given by Miss Doris Rosellini at her home last Friday evening in Miss Kern's honor. The
