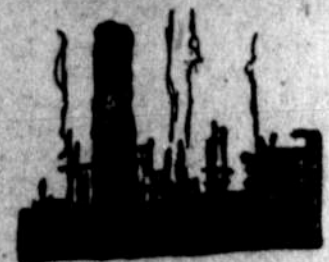

Jane E. Chiene, of Marshfield, was on Monday appointed guardian for Robert S. Chiene, who estate is estimated to be worth \$500.



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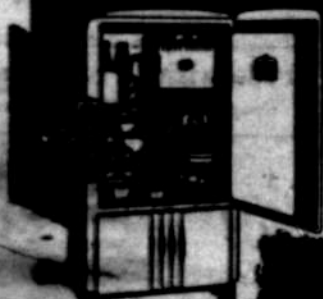
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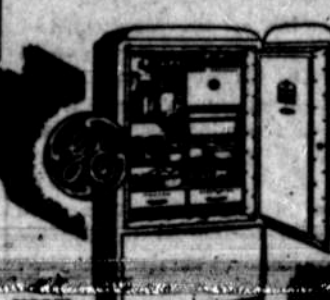
