

Bobcats Win By 35-6 Score

With two of their stellar linemen—Terry and Gilbert—and their running, kicking and passing back—Crouch—out of the line-up, due to injuries or illness, the Coquille Red Devils made one touchdown drive in their Armistice Day game at Athletic Park here Tuesday, with the final score 35-6 in favor of the undefeated Myrtle Point Bobcats.

Immediately after the game Coach Pat Rickard wired a challenge to The Dalles football coach for a post-season meeting of Oregon's only two undefeated major high school teams.

The power plays of Myrtle Point, with Brown, Olson and Bingham

carrying the ball, were too much for the Red Devils' weakened line, and the game was not ten minutes gone before Brown had scored two touchdowns and Porter had kicked for the extra point for each. The fleetness of Harry Brown and the fine Bobcat line permitted them to score three more touchdowns before the finish, Bingham scoring one of them, and the conversion for each was good. The Bobcats stuck strictly to running and bucking plays, their two aerial attempts being incomplete.

After the visitors' fourth touchdown in the third quarter, the Red Devils' passing attack began to click. Following the Bobcat kick-off Whereat made 14 yards around end, Irvine's pass to Butler was good for 17, Tom Martin ran 30 yards after receiving a pass but was forced out of bounds on the three-yard line. The score was made on another pass to Martin over the goal line. He had to jump high in the air for it, while surrounded by Bobcats, but he held on to the ball.
