

Science movement is bound to fulfill its mission. This mission is nobly set forth in the second paragraph of the "Church," on page 53 of Science and Health. The spiritual attitude and altitude of thought on the part of the Christian Scientist is surely "elevating the race, rousing the dormant understanding from material beliefs to the apprehension of spiritual ideas and the demonstration of divine Science. Countersuggestion of mortal mind's opposition may assume to be. The mission of the church, and that means, of course the mission of its members, consists in furthering this true understanding. It means the acknowledgment that all of the good qualities shown forth by nations and races are, in their real nature divine, imperishable, right ideas, included in man, who reflects all whereby we can know God" (Miscellaneous Writings, p. 79).

The United States of America has a specific task to fulfill in the regeneration of the world, which is inevitable as a result of the spiritual activity in Christian Science. Everything being mental, the United States of America is not just a territory occupied by millions of people. It is really a state of consciousness, and thereby a power. The fact that Christian Science was discovered here cannot be too strongly emphasized. It has a deep meaning which the world at large will better understand in the measure that Christian Scientists comprehend more fully their divine status.

The mission of Christian Science is not restricted. That is to say its mission is not only for the healing of personal instances of disease or sin. "Christ's Christianity," the textbook declares (p. 271), "is the chain of scientific being reappearing in all ages, maintaining its obvious correspondence with the Scriptures and uniting all periods in the design of God."

Freedom Spiritual

It was in the United States of America that truth first found enough receptivity and expression to announce real freedom. Freedom is not primarily political, but a spiritual mode of life. Man divinely self-governed shows forth true freedom. Organized evil can never obliterate man's individually self-governed tiny. Our work is to maintain this fact of individual self-government, and to be alertly aware that this is an essential element for the welfare of the human race.

The one and only way to help the human race is to help the human yield to the divine. Christian Science encourages humanity to do this need not be any hesitation in this yielding to real existence, and no fear that something of value will be lost in so doing. Science and Health assures us (p. 302), "It is impossible that man should lose aught that is real, when God is all and eternally his." The human is not a precious and necessary entity in its own. There is nothing to it but a finite, imperfect, temporal, perverted sense of the divine. Whatever seems to be humanly commendable, desirable, enjoyable, and right, is not human but the divine appearing however faintly, in spite of the human not through the human. The possession and enjoyment of the divine itself, as a result of being identified with it, is undoubtedly far more thrilling, practical, and worth while.

Existence as it divinely, actually, is, constitutes the most radiant, satisfying, and happy experience one could ever have or be. When, in place of false belief—always considering itself as a person—the understanding of real, scientific existence appears, a mistaken, meager, belief will readily give itself up. Being but a materially mental belief, all that has to occur is a change of mentality, of concept. In this growth of understanding it should become also possible for that which we have been calling nations to show forth this change of concept.

Mind's manifestation of itself as man—the compound idea including the universe of right ideas—is a universal thought activity, never localized, limited, dormant. It is dynamic, infinite, all-inclusive. When thought is poised as infinite consciousness, there is nothing too far-distant, too difficult, too world-wide to come within the limitless scope of this spiritual realization.

Summary

In summarizing this lecture on Christian Science as the Science of Existence, the following may give a general idea of its trend of thought:

In conformity with the Bible, the oneness and aliveness of God is accepted in Christian Science as the fundamental truth of existence, and thereby the nature of everything that really scientifically exists. Mrs. Eddy's spirituality made her perceive that allness necessitates infinite self-perpetuity and therefore cannot contain an element contrary to its own infinity and eternity. Thus the Discoverer and Founder of Christian Science discerned the entire goodness of God. Divine aliveness being basic and true, whatever appears as contrary to God's nature—presented by material sense testimony—must be classified as baseless and false.

God being all and thereby constituting all reality, the divine status of man is to be found, exclusively, as the knowledge or idea of God. The striking but unavoidable conclusion reached at this point is that man and real existence are virtually identical. In this understanding are infinite possibilities for redemption, health, prosperity, happiness. It enables one to be freed from everything, every belief unlike God or supreme god.

Divine power becomes available in the Christian Science treatment—the affirmation of Truth and the denial of error. It is divine activity, having nothing to do with human will power or suggestion. Christ Jesus was the great Exemplar of this divine activity, which is the eternal, ever-present Christ. His works far from being miracles were an exemplification of divine power. Nowadays these works of healing and redemption abound in the lives of Christian Scientists. Scientifically regarded, they are not human or material. They are the fuller appearance of that which man already divinely is as real existence.

Human or mortal mind is the collective name used in Christian Science for beliefs—for whatever has no divine or substantial existence. Since the one and only Mind is divine, human or mortal mind is a

nonentity, a deception, a negation. The supposed activity of mortal mind is defined as animal magnetism or hypnotism, rampant in a material sense of existence. It assumes nowadays the disguise of aggressive nationalism, using mass hypnotism as one of its main weapons in subduing nations. The only system actually able to deal successfully with the "murderer from the beginning" is Christian Science. Countersuggestion and mere religious faith can never accomplish it, since they both accept the reality of evil and the plurality of man.

As the cradle of Christian Science, the United States of America has an important part in the work of world regeneration. This country stands for the furtherance and protection of true freedom, exemplified by man divinely self-governed. The mission of Christian Science and the mission of the United States of America concur in this enlightened purpose.

Existence is Science

By fundamentally living this Science of Existence, the Christian Scientist is experiencing his divine selfhood—existence as it really is. Hereby he is benefiting humanity by spiritually expressing in everyday life the beauty of existence, its liberty, nobility, joy, its bounty, blessedness, and progressive unfoldment. As the Christian Science textbook (p. 427) so lucidly informs us, "The belief that existence is contingent on matter must be met and mastered by Science before Life can be understood and harmony obtained." Thus, we are evermore vividly aware that our existence is Science, a divinely loving power and logical activity. We are privileged to go forth and live this Science of Existence, which has no other purpose than to bless.

"Our Army" is the heading of an article appearing in the Mather Field, Calif., "Wing Tips," air force publication at the field, which was written by a Coos county boy on duty there, Sergeant Walter A. Rhule, and which appears below:

When I use the term "Our Army," I mean that it belongs to you and me. Also to every American citizen and taxpayer. He has a large interest in it.

"Our Army" is made up of the sons and brothers of the average American family. They come from every walk of life—plumbers, bankers, actors, athletes. They have joined the army for many different reasons—some because they couldn't find work, some because they thought that they could have a lot of fun while gaining valuable experience, some to keep from being drafted.

At times we have to live under adverse conditions, occasionally we have to live in tents, rain or shine, hot or cold. Nor do we always have stoves to keep us warm. But do we complain?

At times we have hot, dusty weather when it is impossible to keep ourselves or our clothes clean. But do we complain? At times we have to use water that has been hauled several miles to camp. We cook over field ranges eat out of mess kits. Sometimes the wind gets so strong that it blows the mess tent down on our heads. Do we complain, do we growl, do we cry?

Certainly we do. We wouldn't be human if we didn't. But all of that is unimportant. We go right on doing our job. We "Keep 'em Flying" regardless of all the adverse conditions. We fulfill any mission that is assigned to us, whether we like the job or not.

The officers of "Our Army" are good leaders. They can be depended on to give consideration to any situation. Their judgment will be fair and just.

Personally I think that the officers and men of "Our Army" can be classified as the finest group of men that can be assembled. We are not men from the society pages. We are not men from "Who's Who." But the American public can be assured that in defending our country and flag, we will do our part. We will not fail.

And neither will the public fail us. It has a part to play that is just as important as ours. We need ships, planes, tanks and guns. The public will make them and we'll man them.

Registration For Sugar

In all cases in the county, except the few listed below, the elementary school in the local district has been designated as the place of registration for sugar books. The date of this registration has not been announced as yet, but will be announced by the State Department of Education, through the head of each first and second class district, and through the office of the county school superintendent.

The hours generally are from 4 to 6 and from 7 to 8, but are sometimes arranged otherwise for consumers who find it more convenient to use other hours than these. Instructions are to the effect that the sugar books will contain coupons covering a 28-week period.

Those persons residing in suspended districts will ordinarily register in the school located in the district to which the children are transported. It has, however, been necessary to make a few exceptions which are listed as follows:

- District No. 79 — South Slough — Register at home of Mrs. Emma Francis.
- District No. 83 — Lakeview — Register at home of Mrs. J. H. Peterson.
- District No. 88 — Base Hill — Register at the Broadbent school.
