Congress Considers Doubling Of Gas Tax

Proposals to double the federal gasoline tax rate from 1½ cents to 3 cents per gallon, and to boost the federal lubricating oil tax from 4½ cents to 10 cents per gallon, are being considered by the Ways and Means committee of the House of Representatives at Washington, D. C. Approximately 90 per cent of total gasoline consumption and 80 per cent of taxable lubricating oils are used in motor vehicles.

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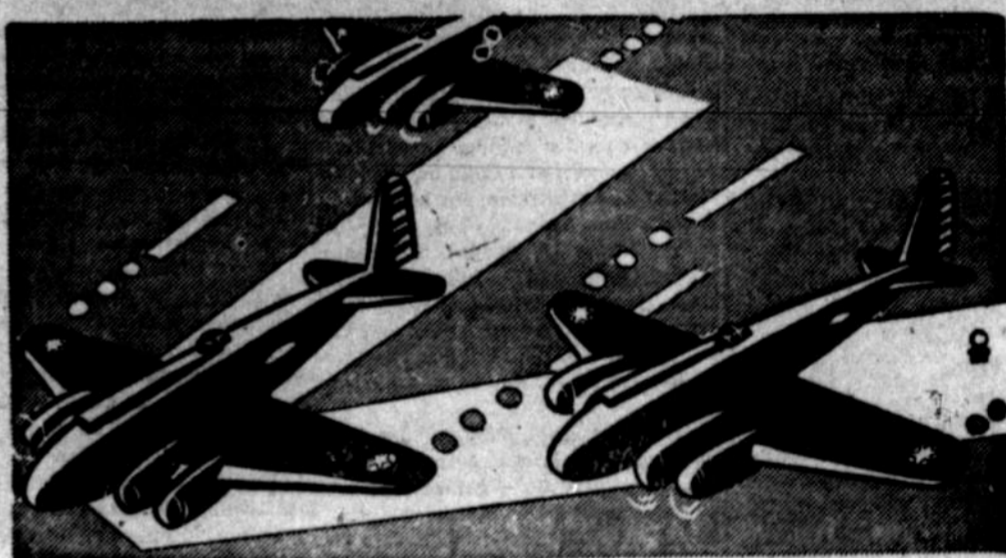
