Library Books Being Packed

Arrangements were made over the week-end with the firemen which permits the librarian and her assistant to continue their work of checking in books returned by the public which had been borrowed before the library board had orders to vacate. Under Mrs. Ellingsen's supervision, boxes of books packed and marked were moved to the north end of the library room. For the purpose of returning borrowed books, the library will be open from two until five o'clock in the afternoons but not in the evenings. The librarian and her assistant are continuing to work dur-

ing the mornings packing and segregating the books. A detailed list is being made of the book stock. When reassembling the books for loaning again, this will serve as a basis for the shelf list.

Plans are being made by the committee for completion of the library room in the new community building. The wiring is to be done soon. The time when the books can be moved into the room is somewhat remote because of the heat problem. The threat to the books is great because if not kept thoroughly dry, between two and three thousand of the books have had binding repairs made with library paste, which will easily mildew.

It is hoped that a place may be secured soon so that service may continue in at least a limited way. There should be no prolonged interruption

of the state library service or student reference loans, nor should the many disappointed individual borrowers be too long denied their reading privileges. Many inquiries are coming in daily both by phone and personal calls to ascertain the time when loan service may resume.
