

### Oregon Pioneer Buried Friday

An Oregon pioneer who was born in Douglas county 85 years ago, Lorenzo D. Belieu, was buried at the Enchanted Prairie family cemetery near Bridge last Friday afternoon, following services at the Schroeder chapel in Myrtle Point. He passed away at his home just outside Myrtle Point last Wednesday.

For many years Mr. Belieu was a prominent stockman above Bridge, but in 1910 he moved to Myrtle Point. He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Olive A. Belieu to whom he was married in 1932. Seven of the eleven children born to himself and his first wife survive. They are Allen Belieu, of Fort Klamath, Ore., L. D. Jr. of Sumner, Mrs. Luzetta Wigant of Empire, Mrs. Leona Johnson and Floyd Robert Belieu, both of Marshfield, Mrs. Naomi Dunham, of Coquille; Mrs. Edna Niebecker, of Dunsmuir, Calif.
