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U. S. O. Entertains "Our Boys"

There probably is not a city, town or hamlet in the United States which has not sent forth some of its sons to serve with the fighting forces. Therefore it should be of interest to parents, relatives and friends of the boys in uniform to know just what United Service Organizations is doing to make the sudden cutting off of home ties more bearable for the young military men.

George F. Hamilton, USO's special representative in charge of operations of club programs in California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Nevada, furnishes some interesting facts regarding the activities of the organization in respect to helping the young fellows on their way to training camp or point of embarkation.

USO now has upwards of 6,000 USO Citizens Committees in the United States from whose personnel are formed sub-committees to assist the National Travelers Aid Society in the establishment of troops in transit lounges and unit clubs in railway and bus terminals. Trains carrying troops are met and, if even a short stop is made, the boys are given coffee and sandwiches, magazines and writing materials and the little god-speed gifts not provided by government issue.

If the stop is of several hours or overnight duration. There are motor tours of the town, frequently, theatre parties, invitations to dinner in homes and other forms of hospitality and entertainment.

Citizens' Committees on the main travelled railways have hundreds of appreciative letters from the young soldiers; letters that speak volumes for the effort spent in successfully maintaining morale.

Arrived at the training camp the young soldier has his established USO club just outside the camp area. In the nearby towns, especially in the combat zones of the United States, leave area clubs are located for his pleasure, convenience and guidance. There he may relax, bathe, shave, read, write, eat, play games, be entertained, dance, or probably be invited to a home for dinner.

The above is only a small service in the USO program. It is an important one however. It makes your boys, our boys, feel they have friends wherever they go. Here or overseas USO maintains service. That is why many cities and towns are conducting a War Fund Campaign for \$32,000,000, and why more cities and towns will conduct a campaign later this

summer. As President Roosevelt has said: "USO has done a great work. It is worth while."

YOUR CAR How to Get the MOST out of it

FEEL ITS PULSE OCCASIONALLY

A modern automobile, like a human being, can take a lot of punishment and still keep going. Just because your car is able to move away from the curb under its own power, don't assume it is operating efficiently. If you notice some obvious symptoms, naturally you investigate. But even if you don't find any symptoms, it pays to run a finger over your car's pulse occasionally.

Simplest check is gas consumption. Fill your tank. Note your speedometer mileage. Keep a record of the gas added. After 1000 miles fill the tank again and divide the mileage driven by the number of gallons added plus the gas required to fill it the second time. Most car ailments affect gas mileage, just as most bodily ailments affect pulse beat. So if your mileage per gallon is low, further investigation is warranted. Bad spark plugs, for example, sometimes waste as much as one gallon in ten.

Occasional periodic check-ups are recommended for the following:

Cooling system. Radiator, flush out twice a year. Fan belt, check for shredding at 10,000 miles.

Ignition system. Distributor points and timing, every 10,000 miles. Spark plugs, every 5,000 miles. Spark control, for correct adjustment to type of gas used.

Fuel system. Automatic choke, twice a year if seasonal adjustments are required. Fuel pump, once or twice a year. Fuel lines, occasionally for leaks. Don't forget the air cleaner needs cleaning too, and don't tinker with the carburetor.

Drive system. Adjust clutch occasionally so that pedal has one inch of "play."
