Included in this group from Coquille are Kathleen Brady, bachelor of arts in business administration; and Francis Thomas Keltner, master of arts in general studies.

President Erb will make the commencement address speaking on "The University and the War of Survival." Bruce Richard Baxter, bishop of the Methodist church for the Portland area, will deliver the baccalaureate address on Sunday morning at 11 o'clock. His topic will be "Going Back Another Way."

Reunions will be held for the classes of 1892, 1902, 1912, 1917 and 1932 on Saturday, May 30. The semi-annual meeting of the University of Oregon Alumni association will also be held on Saturday at 11 a. m.
