Burning Permits In Effect Until May 31

Controlled burning under permit will be allowed up to and including May 31 within the defense area of the state, according to authorization received this week by State Forester N. S. Rogers from Col. J. B. Conmy, IX Army Corps, Fort Lewis. The area involved includes western Oregon and that part of eastern Oregon lying west of the Southern Pacific railway. This new order cancels the former army notification that all burning was to cease on May 14.

"There will be strict enforcement of the permit requirements," stated the forester, "and those desiring to burn, should contact the local wardens. Since the object of this order is to prevent a smoke nuisance subsequent to June 1 that might interfere with army maneuvers and air activities it is essential that the burning be completed by the end of the month."

League Objects To Seizure Of Firearms

"Sportsmen's firearms can only be of value to our nation in time of war when left in the hands of their citizen owners," stated Muri Pettit, president of Coos county chapter, Izak Walton League of America, today when discussing the possible effects of Section 4 of S. 2397, a bill now before congress.

"Section 4 would amend the Property Requisition Act to include the power to requisition firearms owned by individuals for their personal protection or sport," Mr. Pettit explained, "and realizing that miscellaneous and indiscriminate arms would have no real military value, unless left in the hands of the owners at home, it is obvious that the power to register and requisition privately owned firearms would in no way contribute to valid war effort."

"The president now has power to requisition all personal property which is requisite and necessary for military and naval purposes and use, except individually owned firearms. Therefore, Coos county chapter has taken the position of recommending that Section 4 be stricken from S. 2397 as we think it our patriotic duty to continue to insist on unimpaired ownership of firearms. Instead of government discouraging this constitutional right we should be encouraging it in ownership of firearms. Only then can we form a strong and deadly home guard," concluded Mr. Pettit.

Navy Pins Received For Distribution

Navy pins have been received this week by Mrs. Jack Dolan, local chairman of the Navy Relief drive. A quota of \$245.00 has been set by the state committee in charge of raising funds for Navy Relief as Coquille's share in the drive. Though no deadline has been set for the completion of this quota, Mrs. Dolan hopes to have the funds collected by June 1.

Assisting in the drive locally are members of the transportation corps. The navy pins, which sell for \$1.25, count as part of the quota. The entire proceeds from the pins goes to Navy Relief. The pins, which are in great demand by Navy mothers and fathers, and others, whose interest lies with America's first arm of defense and offense, are sterling silver enamelled with a gold star and red anchor on a white background. Mrs. Dolan, or any member of the Transportation Corps can supply pins to those wishing to buy them.

In line with the local drive for Navy Relief, both motion picture theatres are this week showing a short feature, which is devoted to Navy Relief. In the theatre lobbies are jars for drive contributions.

Appreciation From Earl Snell

Five Pounds Sugar For Canning

As previously announced the regulations for home canning in this section allow five pounds of sugar per person per year. Effort has been made to get this increased, especially in a state such as Oregon where home canning is traditional and five pounds per person will not go very far. No relief over that has as yet been granted but it is hoped that it will be done. However, there seems to be an impression that an additional allowance will be granted by merely applying to the Rationing Board and therefore the board quotes herewith a telegram dated May 8 from the state board which shows additional sugar may not yet be obtained:

"Information reaches the state office that there is a widespread impression that sugar for home canning can be obtained over and above the five pounds per person per year provided in Section 1407.71 of Rationing Order No. 3. Will you please take steps to correct this misunderstanding. For your information, we are attempting to obtain a modification of this ruling from Washington permitting additional sugar for home canning where necessary to prevent waste of crops, but to date there is not such authority."
