Non High Budget
Larger This YearAt a meeting Saturday evening,
the budget committee for the Non
High School district prepared a bud-
get with a levy of \$86,322.88. This
is a six percent increase over the
amount of the budget for last year.
The board found this necessary be-
cause of the increased costs in tu-
ition and transportation and because
of the fact that there would be at
the end of this year some \$30,000.00
warrants outstanding.In addition to the regular five
members of the Non High board the
following budget committee members
were elected and sworn in by W. M.
Miller, chairman:Gilbert Olson, Greenacres, W. H.
Eickworth, Empire, Graydon Ander-
son, Roy, and Mrs. Flossie Wilson,
Sitkum. The chairman for the bud-
get meeting was Mr. Anderson and
the secretary, Mrs. Wilson.Both the budget committee and the
Non High school board passed res-
olutions favoring the very careful con-
sideration for another year as to
whether or not buses would be per-
mitted or discontinued. All contracts
which are now in effect will expire
at the end of the school year of 1943.The law compels the Non High
school district to pay the tuition for
all Non High school students, but
leaves the matter of transportation
optional. The board has always felt
however, that since the tuition is
the major expense and since this falls
with equal burden upon the taxpay-
ers in the Non High school district,
that it was only just to provide trans-
portation in order that the children
in all districts, in spite of location,
might have equal opportunities. The
estimated amount to be spent for tu-
ition is \$66,000.00 and the estimated
amount to be spent for transporta-
tion is \$36,000.00.The Non High school district has
made quite a decrease in the amount
of warrant indebtedness during the
last year and there is a possibility
that no difficulty will be experienced
next year when time comes for
drawing up the budget.June 24, at 8 p. m. has been set for
the final hearing of the Non High

Ordered To Evacuate
Orders calling for the evacuation
of an additional 3,250 Japanese from
Pacific Coast areas were issued last
Thursday by Lieut. Gen. J. L. DeWitt.
These new orders will bring the total
of Japanese in assembly or reception
centers, or under evacuation orders,
to more than 81,000. The new orders
affect areas in both California and
Oregon. Five entire counties in Ore-
gon are included: Washington, Yam-
hill, Tillamook, Clatsop and Colum-
bia, with all portions of Multnomah
county not previously covered by
exclusion orders.
