Bus Schedules Changed To Meet New 40-Mile Speed Limit

Pacific Greyhound Lines announced today that, beginning July 1, their buses in this area will be operated within a speed limit of 40-miles per hour. By running at this reduced speed the bus company is cooperating with the government's rubber conservation program. It is also keeping with the voluntary action of patriotic citizens in operating their private cars under 40-miles per hour.
