**Rural Route Carriers For The Next 4 Years**

Two new rural route mail carriers out of the Coquille postoffice started upon their six days a week deliveries yesterday morning and two others succeed themselves on a renewal of contract. All are for a four-year period.

R. H. Southstone succeeds Glen Hutton on the Coquille-McKinley route which goes out past the Norway school house. His compensation for the 31.4 miles trip is to be \$1947 per annum.

Victor G. Pettengill's contract for the 20.5 miles round trip to Fairview route is a renewal and is posted to pay \$1800 a year.

Chas. H. Randall succeeds E. E. Morgan on the 25.5 miles of the Coquille-Bullards route for which he is to be paid \$1950 per annum.

Take Cook's contract for the Coquille-Arago route is a renewal for which he will receive \$1989 per annum for the 28.6 miles of that route.

**H. A. Todd, Arago, Buried Saturday**

Harvey Avery Todd, for many years a resident of Arago, passed away last Thursday afternoon at the Belle Knife Hospital, of which he had been an inmate for the past six years, and the funeral services were conducted at the Schroeder Brothers' Chapel here at 2:00 p. m. on Saturday, by Rev. G. A. Gray. Interment was in the Masonic cemetery.

Mr. Todd was born at Cross River, N. Y., Oct. 29, 1857, and was seven months and 28 days past 84 years of

age. While a small boy his parents moved to Wisconsin and he came to Oregon in 1897.

He was united in marriage to Media L. Fish in the east in 1883. Of the three children born to them, Ruth, Frank and Irving Todd, all passed away several years ago.

Mr. Todd was well and most favorably known in Coquille and the Coquille valley. For years he sold strawberries here which came from his Arago ranch and which were labeled "Round Hill Strawberries."

He was a life member of the Masonic order, holding his membership

in the lodge where he was raised in Prescott, Wis.
