Valid Dates For Sugar Stamps 5 And 6

There has been so much confusion about the validity of sugar rationing stamps that the local rationing board quotes as follows a telegram received from headquarters in Washington, D. C.:

"Section 1407.243 is amended so that Stamp Number 5 is valid between June 28, 1942, and July 25, 1942, for the purchase of 2 pounds of sugar, Stamp Number 6 is valid between July 26, 1942 and August 22, 1942, for the purchase of 2 pounds of sugar."
