War Industries Need Workmen

There is a constant demand for workers in critical occupations in war industries. Any person not now engaged in an occupation essential to the war effort should contact the United States Employment Service at Marshfield for information, so that every person's best skill may be used where it is most needed.

For those who are willing to take training for positions as welders, aviation sheet-metal workers, machine-tool operators, ship carpenters or electricians there are classes open to both men and women in Marsh-

field. The training itself is without cost to the trainee, and upon the successful completion of the training they will be referred directly to jobs without delay. If there are some individuals who need employment while taking training, the United States Employment Service at Marshfield will attempt to provide this employment.

Persons who are employed in the sawmill and logging industries, or other work that is critically needed at this time, should not leave their work. However, there are many people who can be used if they will make themselves available, and it is these persons that the Marshfield office would

like to enroll.

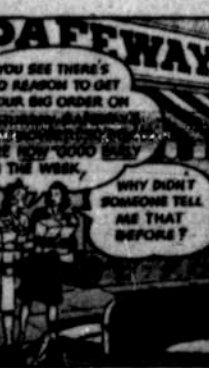
