

Myrtle Point Blanks C. H. S. In Opener

Last Quarter Rally Nets Victory For Invaders

The Myrtle Point Bobcats rule the Coquille valley this week by virtue of their initial victory over an underdog Red Devil 11 on the Coquille Athletic field, Oct. 3 before a large crowd of fans. The Bobcats showed little finesse but lots of drive in overcoming the Devil crew and disclosed a player to watch in the personage of Lee Zinn, sophomore half back. Zinn broke through the Coquille forward wall time and again to race for long gains. A play by play account of the bout is as follows: Myrtle Point received Coquille kick-off and returned it 20 yards to the 30 yard line. M. P. smashed through center for four yards and lost one yard on center back, but made it back on the next play. Pointer then punted to the Coquille 35 yard line. Irvin slashed through center to the 42 yard line and McCracken made it a first down on the 50. The next play Coquille was penalized five yards and McCracken went for two yards through center. Myrtle Point intercepted Howe's pass to Martin on Myrtle Point's 48 and returned it to Coquille 43 yard stripe. M. P. trucked around right end to Coquille's 20 yard line and a first down. Weekley dived for one yard through center, followed by a no-gain play.

Taking over on their own 19, Irvin slashed through center to the 48 yard line and a first down. Howe picked up two yards on a center buck followed by a Myrtle Point interception on M. P. 18 yard line. M. P. strolled for three digits through center and for two 1 yard gains off-tackle as the first round ended 0 to 0.

Starting the second quarter, M. P. punted to Coquille's 40 and McCracken returned seven yards to the 47. Red Irvin dived for one yard, and then lost four yards on off-tackle play, followed by an incomplete pass. Red punted to Myrtle Point's 30. The Bobcats were penalized five yards on off-side followed by a no-gain play, and a four yard gain to the 29. Weekley punted to Coquille's 37 yard line and Coquille was held there. Irvin dashed off-tackle to the 40, Howe palled a quarter-back sneak to the 43, and McCracken made it to the 44. Red Irvin punted out of danger to the M. P. 40. Zinn plowed to the 46 through center and Howe intercepted a Bobcat pass on Coquille's 40, returning it to the 48 before being brought down.

Irvin smashed through center to the 50, and duplicated his play to the 48, followed by an incomplete pass. Irvin punted to M. P. 30, and Zinn on an end run plowed to the 43 and a first down. No gain, and Marvin Floyd raced through center to Coquille's 45 before being pulled down. The Cats made a no-gain play and were penalized five yards for an off-side as the first half ended 0 to 0.

Coquille received the kick-off on their own 41, and returned it to the 48. McCracken fumbled and recovered on the 40, and then raced to the Bobcat 35 and a first down. No gain, and an incomplete pass to Hickam. Irvin danced through center to the 31, followed by an incomplete pass to McCracken in the flat. Taking over, Myrtle Point lost two yards, incomplete pass, around left end to the 35 and a first down through center to the 41. Deaver through center to the 45, off-tackle to 50, and again off-tackle to Coquille's 48. Around end to Coquille's 45, and a first down on the Red Devils 42. Zinn went through center to the 42, and again around right end to the 38, followed by two center plunges resulting in a first down on the 35. McCarty plunged off-tackle for a first down on the 44, then lost to the 40, followed by an incomplete pass to Hickam. Frosh Davy Kline smashed through center to the 48, and Coquille punted to the Myrtle Point 32. Zinn went over center to the 34 as the third round ended.

On the next play Zinn smashed his way to the Coquille 48 and a first down. Deaver slashed to the 45, lost to the 44, followed by an incomplete pass as Coquille took over on their own 44. Incomplete pass, no gain through center, then a Myrtle Point interception returned to Coquille's 18-yard line which put the Cats in a scoring position. Zinn galloped around right end to Coquille's two and Floyd scored on a quarter-back sneak from the two. The conversion was no good and Myrtle Point led 6-0 mid-way in the fourth round.

The Red Devils received the kick-off on the 30 and returned to the 38. McCracken slashed through center to Coquille's 45, and McCarty made it a first down on Myrtle Point's 45. Incomplete pass to Martin over center, Irvin through center to the 43, followed by a three yard gain by McCracken. McCarty made two yards as Myrtle Point took over on their own 38. Zinn failed to gain on a left end run, then the Bobcats completed a pass to the 43. Floyd through center to the 48, then through center again to the Coquille 31, and

This was both team's first bout, and showed some pretty ragged playing on each eleven. The Devils had the Bobcat's stopped cold the first three quarters, but two quick smashes through a dogged and head-up defense netted the invaders their two tallies. The line held very well for Coquille, considering that most of it was made up of green players who had little or no experience. One of Myrtle Point's touchdowns came from a pass interception returned to Coquille's 18 yard line. Lee Zinn, speedy Cat half-back went around end to the two yard stripe, and Marvin Floyd, carried the mail over from the two for the Myrtle Towner's first score. The next score was the climax of a long drive deep into Red Devils territory with Weekley and Zinn doing most of the ball lugging. Again Zinn sprinted around right end to pay dirt and crossed the goal line standing up.

Well, Marshfield has done it again. The amazing Pirates from the mud-flat city have played another unscored game, this time with the Astoria Fishermen who went down to defeat on their field 20-0 before the Purple and Gold Tide from Marshfield. According to some highly elated individuals in Marstown, the Pirates are a sure bet for the state crown. Just how true this prediction is will remain to be seen when the Pirates receive the acid test in their own conference bracket. If the Pirates should be sneared with a superiority complex, they may also be smeared by one of the so-called "small" schools in their own conference.

With reference to Marshfield's titular claims which sounds very much like unadulterated super-drooper optimism so early in the season, one can only say—(Quote) "Who knows" (Unquote).

Permission Must Be Secured

Jerrold Owen, state defense coordinator, has issued a warning to all persons responsible for public gatherings in the Oregon "Combat Zone" who fail to obtain permission from the Western Defense Command. He pointed out that failure to comply could easily result in a ban on highly publicized, scheduled football games and similar gatherings at the last minute by the army authorities.

In addition to obtaining army approval, all night gatherings in the combat area, lying west of the Cascade Mountains, must also be approved by the Civilian Defense Lighting Engineers in the district involved.

Leo G. Spitzbart, newly appointed liaison officer between the state defense council and the military command, should be advised of the time, place, approximate number of persons expected, and details as to the policing arrangements well in advance of the gatherings, said Owen.

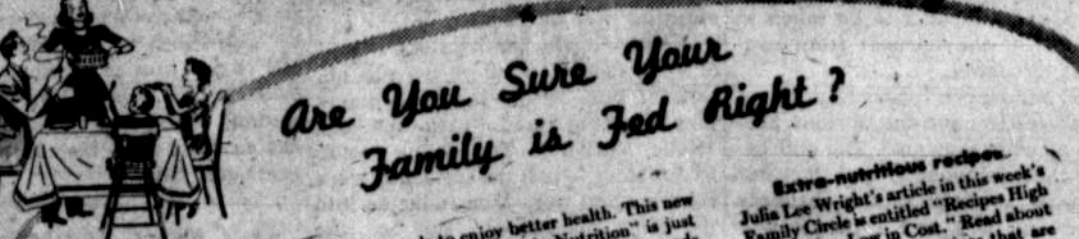
