It will be impossible to give classes in welding as had been planned and previously announced in this column. The welding rods seem to be unobtainable at this time. However, defense classes will be held at the school. The first class, starting around the middle of the month, will be a class in farm machinery repair. The War Production Board meeting was held at Dave Philpott's home Monday night and at the meeting it was decided to try defense classes at Riverton in farm machinery repairs and if they prove successful, classes will also be held at Bandon and at Coquille. We might note that only 35 per cent of the amount of machinery sold last year will be available next year, due to shortage in material. It was emphasized very strongly at the meeting that farmers get machines that they have in repair and operation so that they can meet the production goals more easily. These classes will take up the operation, care, and repair of trucks, tractors and autos.

There are quite a number of available subjects to be taught if enough interest is shown in them. It is necessary that at least ten persons sign

for these classes and qualified and competent instructors will be obtained for each course taught. A list of the courses follows:

1. The course in Farm Machines.
 2. A course in metal work, including drilling, tempering and machinery repair.
 3. Wood working, including anything that is connected with carpentry. No furniture repair nor cabinet making will be taught, however.
 4. Elementary Electricity, including operation, care and repair of electrical equipment. These last three courses are one hundred twenty hour courses. The farm machinery course is a thirty-six hour course.
 5. Increasing milk production.
 6. Increasing poultry and meat production.
 7. Egg production.
 8. Pork production.
 9. Beef production.
 10. Mutton, Lamb and Wool production.
 11. Vegetable production, which will take up the different aspects of home growing, of which there has become a great need. Classes five through eleven are twenty-hour courses.
- Any out-of-school person, seventeen years or over, may enroll. Those classes may be organized anywhere. Shop classes, that is, classes in metal, machinery, etc., will need a shop available, of course; however, any of the commodity courses may be taught anywhere. Any person could have the classes in his own home if desired and if at least ten people will sign up and attend the meetings. Mr. Koch is the defense instructor at Riverton and we are sure that he would be glad to help anyone get started in these classes.
