#### 75,000 Pressure Cookers To Be Released This Fall

"Word has just been received from the United States Department of Agriculture that some time during this fall about 75,000 pressure cookers will be released by various manufacturers for home canners," says Mrs. Dorothy E. Bishop, home demonstration agent for Coos county.

The Federal committee investigated a possible rationing plan but finally came to the conclusion that rationing this year would be of more hindrance than help since the number of cookers involved is so small and the season is so late. Since canning is more difficult in the botulinus area, namely the western and southern states, Miss Birdseye, United States Department of Agriculture, suggests that people in these states place their orders for these cookers at once through their local trade channels. This is not an assurance that the person who places the order will be able to get a cooker but will indicate where these cookers will be needed when the time comes for distribution.

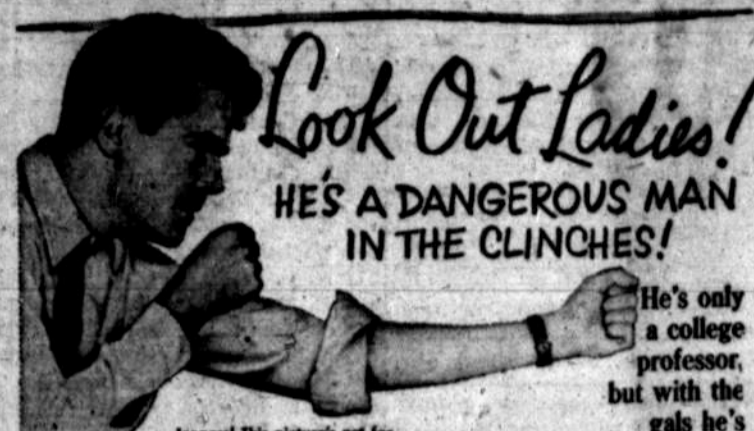

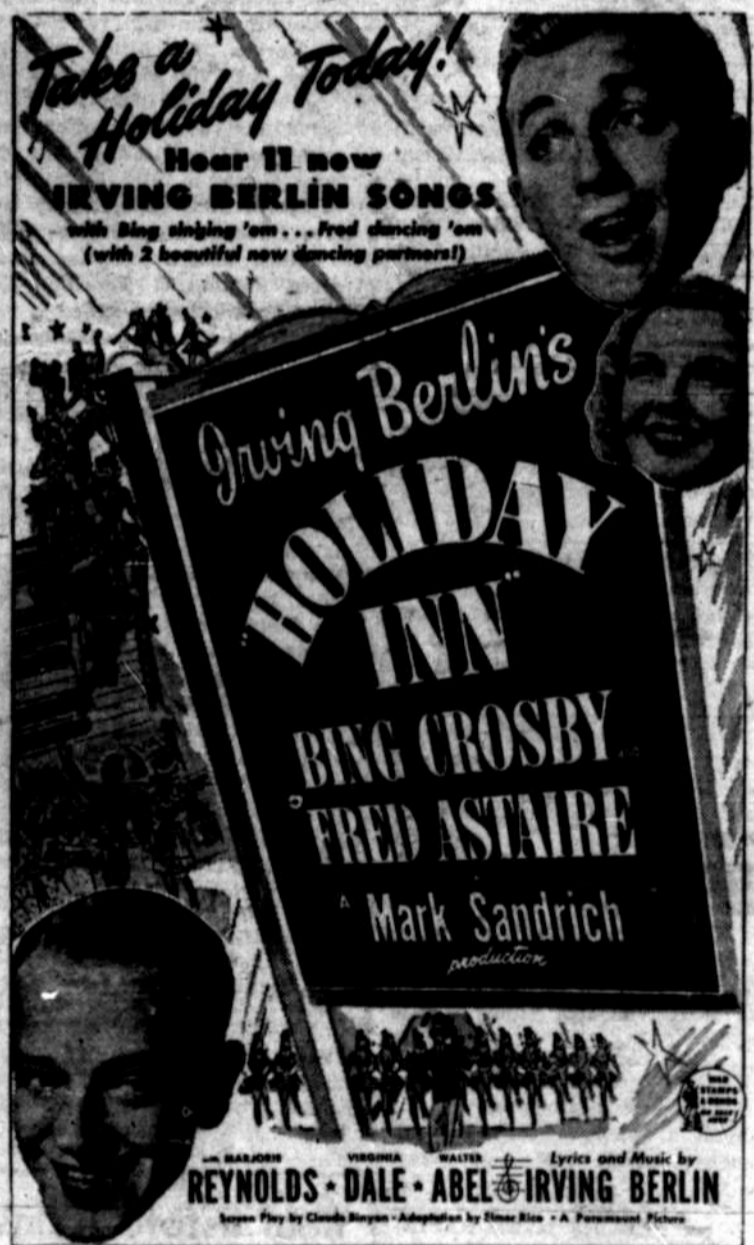
