Bulldogs Trim Red Devils 25 to 7

The North Bend Bulldogs really showed their teeth last Saturday at their own ball park, when they grabbed an early lead against Coquille and held on with the proverbial "Bulldog Tenacity," while adding a few more points, to take a lop-sided win from the local 25-7. By this win, the "Dogs showed themselves as a logical conference champ contender along with Marshfield who tripped the Myrtle Point Bobcats that same afternoon, 24-0.

The first Bulldog score was made on a long drive deep into Red Devil territory climaxed by Snidow's touchdown lunge from the 2-yard stripe. The conversion was blocked by the Devils most outstanding lineman of the day, Tom Martin. Both elevens juggled the ball back and forth; then North Bend forged down the field 88 yards to pay-dirt. This tally was really the turning point of the game. A long pass to Snidow, good for 51 yards, set up the second six points and then Snidow sailed one to Williamson who crossed the chalk-stripe standing up.

Receiving the kick-off, the Devils marched to the Bulldogs' 19-yard line where Beauchemin intercepted a pass. A few minutes later, McCracken intercepted a North Bend toss, on the 42. In three successive plays, with McCracken, McCarthy and Irvin packing the mail, the locals marched to the one-yard stripe, where Howe juggled it over on a quarterback sneak. Irvin smashed off-tackle for the conversion and the score stood 12-7.

The Bulldogs received and then proceeded to march to pay-dirt, with Snidow tallying from the 3-yd. line. The conversion was no good and the hosts lead 18-7.

It looked like another Devil score after the kick-off when they sneaked to the North Bend 18, but Snidow halted this threat by snagging a pass on his own 12. Then followed the Pony Slough eleven's final touchdown march, with Ruppe dancing over from the 10-yd. Ruppe scored the only conversion on a fake kick and the "Dogs lead 25-7.

After the kick-off, and with only two minutes remaining, Leslie sent in his second string. Frosh Davy Kline on a spinner slashed off-tackle for a first down on North Bend's 44. Then Frosh Bud Meek slickered the Bulldog defense and trotted around left-end for 13 yards only to fumble, stopping what appeared to be a last minute touchdown jaunt. Taking over on their own 31, the Bulldogs pulled three successive line plays but were held in their tracks by the spirited second string line, as the game ended with the North Bend Bul-
