### Three Indicted By Grand Jury

The grand jury for the October term of court brought in four true bills last Friday and two not true. The two covered previous charges against one young man, Lynn Elmer Thorpe.

John Neal Haines, who was indicted for larceny of livestock at Fairview last summer, was arraigned on Friday. He pleaded not guilty and his trial was set for next Monday.

Otto Lafayette Cox, who was indicted for driving a car while under the influence of liquor, was represented by Attorney Carl Mark, who entered a plea of not guilty. His case was set for trial last Monday and when he failed to appear, Judge King declared his cash bail forfeited.

of the water there from what it had been heretofore and that there was no other place for it to run. The only way it could possibly have been averted was by building up the street so it would have been impossible to get a car into her place or the Aasen place.

The ordinance establishing the assessment was not ready for the council to act upon and the objection will be considered at the next meeting.

A new dim-out ordinance for the city, as proposed by the Ninth Corps Area office at San Francisco, was adopted. It repeats the one adopted last December and becomes effective this coming Sunday, Oct. 25. Mr. Berg said the new ordinance is broader and more stringent, and it is necessary for protection of this city as well as for vessels at sea that the dim-out regulations be made officially by the city as well as by the army regulations.

The request of the Southern Pacific that the city install "Stop" signs at all railroad crossings within the city limits was referred to D. J. Sage, state highway engineer for this district, for approval before signs are set up at the bridge and the Cunningham creek crossing. One will also be installed below the depot at the point where the road to the creamery crosses the tracks.

At the request of the fire department, it was ordered that cars be forbidden the privilege of parking under the trestle and on the pavement west of the Cream O'Coos plant. Sunday that space was parked with locked cars which would have prevented the department from reaching the stand pipe through which water will be drawn in case of a fire in the down town district.

About an hour was spent in discussing water rates for auto camps and apartment houses, in an effort to make those rates uniform so that one owner will not have any advantage over another.

The practice of allowing the proprietor to tell what cabins or apartments were unoccupied during the month was criticized and it was decided to seal all faucets of unoccupied cabins; then if the seal was broken the city would claim payment for that cabin or apartment for the month, shutting off of water being the penalty for refusing to pay. The new regulations becomes effective Nov. 15.

### The Wording Is Too Compelling

The Sentinel is quite doubtful as to the advisability of voting "yes" on the initiated petition measure which appears on the ballot at the Nov. 3 election as a "Bill Distributing Surplus Funds to School Districts, Reducing Taxes Therein"—312 and 313—but it is pleased to present the following statement which was submitted for publication by Burton W. Dunn, local school superintendent.

For one year the proposal might be advantageous, and as Mr. Dunn has previously said in talks on the subject, the bill would be more acceptable if the measure had not been worded to include "all" moneys received from state income tax sources in excess of \$7,500,000 in any year to be distributed among school districts.

Mr. Dunn's statistical article is as follows:

Local school district taxes would be reduced approximately 50 per cent next year if the proposed initiative measure diverting excess state income taxes to school districts becomes law.

The local district would receive about \$28,000.00, which is slightly over half the amount of money raised by special tax in this district.

The proposed initiative measure provides that all income tax receipts in excess of \$7,750,000 be distributed to all school districts in the state according to the number of pupils educated in their respective districts.

The estimated income tax receipts according to a recent announcement from the State Tax Commission is \$14,000,000 for the year 1942.

Sponsors of the measure claim it would provide substantial benefits to education in Oregon and to the local property owners who now bear 98.3 per cent of the cost of their local schools.

California, Washington and Utah, contribute an average of 46.6 per cent state support of their schools, while Oregon stands at the bottom of the list of all states in the Union with only 1.7 per cent now being contributed by the state.
