Flynn and Reagan In "Desperate Journey" At Roxy Thur. to Sat.

Dashing Errol Flynn, who has become famous for his action-packed roles, is now cast in a part that is more fraught with adventure and excitement than any he has played heretofore. The film is Warner Bros. "Desperate Journey," which will make its debut Thursday at the Roxy Theatre, and in it Flynn plays the role of a Flight Lieutenant in the R. A. F.

Other famous players in the cast, as members of the British Hudson bomber, of which Flynn has command, are Ronald Reagan, Alan Hale, Arthur Kennedy and Ronald Sinclair. It is as brusque, devil-may-care, and as hardy a crew as has ever set out to bomb Germany.

In order to bomb their objective more accurately, Flynn commands them to fly lower despite the fact that the section is known to have exceptionally heavy anti-aircraft protection. They start their return flight, after successfully bombing their objective, when they are brought down by a particularly sharp burst of anti-aircraft fire.

The five prisoners of war are brought before a Nazi intelligence officer, played by Raymond Massey. He fires many questions at them, but

one he neglected to ask was just how powerful Reagan's right hand is. He realizes his mistake after he has regained consciousness and his five-prisoners have escaped.

An intensive search for them gets underway. Led by Flynn and Reagan, fed on meager rations, the five make slow nightly progress across Germany toward Holland and the coast. They manage to secure Nazi uniforms from some unwary sentries who patrol lonely bridge-heads and in this manner gamble the chances of being shot as spies against the chance of eventually escaping with vital military information which they secured from Massey's office.

Through sheer luck, they board a luxurious but empty private car attached to a hospital train that is bound for Berlin. As the train nears its destination they are discovered by a guard who, mistaking them for Nazi soldiers with no business in the car, forces them out.

In Berlin, the story becomes even more exciting as the five continue to outsmart the Gestapo and set fire to a large plant that manufactures incendiary bombs. They meet Kaethe Brahm, played by Nancy Coleman, a girl who, living inside Germany does her best to help the Allied cause and sabotage the Nazis. It is through her that they are able to reach the Holland border and make their eventual escape to England.

Record For First Year Of War

The Office of War Information announced that the United States in the year of 1942 will have produced approximately 49,000 planes, 32,000 tanks and self-propelled artillery, 17,000 anti-aircraft guns larger than 20-mm., 8,200,000 tons of merchant shipping, thousands of anti-aircraft machine guns, and thousands of scout cars and half and full-track carriers. Munitions and war construction were "above the most optimistic estimate of our production possibilities a year ago," and food production—a large proportion of which was meat, milk, eggs, and soy beans—was 12 per cent above the previous year.

Expenditures for the year for munitions and war construction will total \$47,000,000,000. In the first ten months of 1942, more than \$13,000,000,000 were collected in taxes and more than \$33,000,000,000 through the sale of bonds and other government obligations. Approximately 17,500,000 people are now employed in war work—compared to 7,000,000 a year ago—but in 1943 an additional 5,000,000 will be needed for war work and for the Armed forces. By March 15, 1942, the cost of living had risen 15 per cent over the end of 1939, but price regulation, instituted in April, held down the increases in those prices subject to control to six-tenths of one per cent as of October 15.
