The Office of War Information an-nounced that the United States in the year of 1942 will have produced approximately 49,000 planes, 32,000 tanks and self-propelled artillery, 17,000 antiaircraft guns larger than 20-mm., 8,200,000 tons of merchant shipping, thousands of antiaircraft machine guns, and thousands of scout cars and half and full-track carriers, Munitions and war construction were "above the most optimistic estimate of our production possibilities a year ago," and food production-a large the United States. proportion of which was meat, milk The purpose of "Who's Who" is to eggs, and soy beans-was 12 per cent above the previous year.

Expenditures for the year for munitions and war construction will total \$47,000,000,000.
